

Background

The preservation and development of High Nature Value (HNV) farming and forestry systems is an objective of EU Rural Development Policy and the Member States have put measures in place to achieve this in their Rural Development Programmes (RDPs).


There are three HNV indicators in the Common Monitoring and Evaluation Framework (CMEF) that need to be considered:

- Baseline indicator 18: HNV farmland and forestry;
- Result indicator 6: HNV farming and forestry areas under successful land management; and
- Common impact indicator 5: maintenance of HNV farmland and forestry.

The CMEF approach to assessing HNV farming and forestry acknowledges the varied histories and experience of environmental monitoring across the EU and the variation in HNV farmland characteristics. It therefore does not prescribe a specific method for the assessment of either the extent or the condition of HNV farmland. Instead, programme authorities are asked to assess the extent and condition of HNV farmland within the RDP area. This is done using the best data available to them, their own choice of appropriate methods and subsidiary indicators and with the aid of the guidance and methodological support provided.
